The Republican senatorial convention for the fiftieth district, embracing the counties of Cattaraugus and Chautauqua, has unanimously renominated Frank W. Higgins of Olean.

The A. P. A. cry in politics never yet accomplished anything and never will. It simply shows what desperate straits some people get into to make a point when there is no point to make.

Everything indicates that the country is going to have a booming fall trade. Improvement is spreading into all branches, and merchants in all lines are looking forward with more confidence in the future than they have felt for many years.

A Mexican judge has just sentenced a duelist, Col. Romero, to prison for three years and four months at hard labor, to pay all the costs of the trial, to pay opponent's, Verastegul's, funeral expenses, to pay a fine of \$1,900 or serve three months more in prison, and to pay in monthly installments to Verastegul's widow and children \$4,500 annually for 18 years. This is the most sensible thing that was ever done in the annals of duelling.

The News has received a copy of a new monthly publication, *The Dog Question*. It is published by J. L. Taylor at Dubbs Ferry, N. Y. It is the first periodical we have ever seen which took a position against the dog. There is much to be said on that side of the question, and the paper makes a truthful statement when it says "the dog's proper place, if he is entitled to it at all to a place in the community, is at the end of a strong chain." We believe this will apply to ninety-nine out of every hundred dogs.

The special Assembly committee appointed last winter to investigate and report to the next Legislature on the question of securing better public roads has held a number of sessions in central, northern and western New York. They consult with supervisors, invite suggestions from them as to what is desired and methods for obtaining it. The committee has been inspecting improved roads in Massachusetts and New Jersey, and in these sessions acquaint the people of the state, who are interested, with the results of their inspection. This is a means of disseminating information on the topic most desired, and of encouraging a disposition to provide better highways for public travel. Utica, Syracuse, Watertown, Auburn, Rochester and Buffalo in turn will be visited by this committee. These cities have large numbers of people interested in making them centers of travel and who favor improved methods of road building. The wheelmen, too, are especially interested in this topic and to their agitation is largely due the

increased interest which prompted the Legislature to provide for a committee and report on what is desired and how to obtain it.
