**Editor Stillman May Lose an Eye.**  
Last Thursday Roger Stillman, editor of the Belmont Dispatch, met with an accident which may result in the loss of an eye. He was patching some boys who were playing ball, and occasionally taking a hand in the game himself. A boy threw the ball at Mr. Stillman, and instead of striking in his hands the ball hit him in the right eye. An examination showed that the retina was broken and it is thought the sight of this eye may have been entirely destroyed. We hope the injury may prove to be less serious than was at first supposed.

**The Mileage Books.**  
The new mileage books on the Erie are not very popular. It is rumored that the conductors have very strict orders about enforcing the rules, and will bounce the people who try to use books other than their own. But the scalpers are busy getting things in shape to meet the emergency, and the end may be a withdrawal of the books or their general use as heretofore. It has been stated that it will be a comparatively easy matter to have a law made next winter reducing the fare to two cents a mile, as annual passes don't go any more, and the law-makers will be independent of any dictation from the railroad managers. We are not certain, however, that a railroad company's charter can be "monkeyed with" to that extent. A test case is now being tried to determine whether the law requiring the railroad companies to issue 1,000 mile books at two cents a mile is constitutional.

**Is It Anthrax?**  
Mrs. Charles Wilcox, who lives on the east hill road to Whitesville, has lost her entire dairy of five cows within the past ten days, from a disease which, according to the judgment of several who are familiar with the case, is probably anthrax, a distemper which is attacking cattle in various portions of the country, and which is supposed to be incurable. A cow dies in from 36 to 48 hours after being attacked. We have also learned of others who have lost cattle from a disease similar to that which attacked Mrs. Wilcox's herd, and it is possible that the dread anthrax has reached this vicinity.

**BRIEF NEWS NOTES.**  
A genius in Cuba has constructed a machine which he calls a "hopperdozer," made to catch grasshoppers. The machine can be made by any tinsmith at a comparatively small expense, so it is said.

Bolton Hall, Vice-President and Secretary of the New York Tax Reform Association, will deliver an address upon "Home Rule in Taxation" at the Angelica Fair Sept. 11, at eleven o'clock a. m.

Water from more springs will be turned into Cuba's water mains. The consumption is now so great that a shortage of water was apparent. The annual receipts are \$3,000, and the list of consumers includes two railroads.

The farmers of Erie, Cattaraugus, Wyoming and other Western New York counties believe in consequence of the high price of feed that it is more economical to sell their cattle at \$10 a head than to keep them through the winter for the milk. Consequently great numbers are offered at the East Buffalo market every week.

The exercises attending the laying of the corner stone of the new Catholic church will occur on next Sunday, Sept. 8th. High mass will be observed at the Church of Immaculate Conception on Sunday morning at 10 o'clock instead of the usual hour 10:30, and the imposing exercises attending the laying of the corner stone of the new edifice will follow. Among the distinguished visitors who will be present on that day will be the Right Rev. Bishop Ryan of Buffalo.—Wellsville Reporter.

Charles Adsit, cashier of the First National bank in Hornellsville, met with a terrible accident Saturday afternoon while assisting with the races at the fair. A half-mile running race had just been sent off and Mr. Adsit started down the track with a basket on his arm containing some bottles. In some unaccountable manner Mr. Adsit was run into by one of the running horses, knocked down and the hind foot of the horse was planted on his face. The cork on the shoe of the horse cut into the bridge of his nose for over an inch, pushing it in a horrible manner. The flesh was scraped from his cheekbone. When taken from the track it was thought he was dead, but he soon rallied and is now recovering.
