New York dispatches announce that "the cigarette manufacturers are engaged in a war to the death." They must be smoking each others cigarettes.

It is rumored that Hon. Fred A. Robbins of this county will be a candidate for Speaker of the next Assembly. He would be just as good a presiding officer as he has been an Assemblyman for two years past.

The Defender and Valkyrie will contest for the America's cup on the following dates: First race, Saturday, Sept. 7; second race, Tuesday, Sept. 10; third race, Thursday, Sept. 12. If more than three races are required they will follow with one day intervening between the races.

Chauncey M. Depew must pay more attention to railroading. The English are beating him. The Empire State Express is no longer the fastest train in the world. A train on the London & Northwestern Railway has usurped the honor, and we rely upon Chauncey to become the Capt. Hank Haff of dry land.

Defender will endeavor to keep the America's cup on this side of the Atlantic. There is a fear that she is not quite swift enough. She is the best we have, however, and if we are beaten it will not be because we are less smart than we were, but because the British have suddenly grown much smarter than they were.

A new use for fly-paper has been found in Chicago. A man was arrested there on Monday charged with robbing alms-boxes with strips of the sticky paper. Forty pennies and a number of nickels and dimes were found in his pockets, covered with the sticky substance used on fly-paper, and strips of the paper, cut to the proper width, were also discovered in his possession. That man has genius enough to invent a flying machine if he will put it to the right use.

Out in the 16th Senatorial district of Iowa they are giving farce-comedy performances at a great rate. The present farce is presented by the political leaders of Adair and Madison counties. These counties comprise the Senatorial district, and in the rivalry aroused between them neither delegation will consent that the convention be held in the other delegation's county. So, by agreement, they assembled right on the county line, eleven Adair men on one side and eleven Madisonites on the other. Being of equal size, the two delegations were able to make a similar fight as to candidates. Up to date they have taken 3,012 ballots, and have now retired for a rest, after which they will begin balloting some more.

Bernard Carney, a New York plumber, has been adjudged an "habitual criminal," and was last week sentenced by Recorder Goff to nine years and five months in State prison. The statute defining habitual criminals has been on the statute books since 1881, but instances of the infliction of a penalty under the law are very rare. The habitual criminal is liable to arrest anywhere in the State, summarily, with or without a warrant, and to punishment as a disorderly person when there is any reasonable ground to suspect that he is contemplating a crime or when he is found carrying any dangerous weapon or any instrument used by criminals. He is not entitled to a jury trial. His person and his abode are at all times liable to search by

any officer, with or without a warrant, and magistrates or overseers of the poor may exercise over his person such control and supervision as a parent exercises over a minor child. Only the Governor's pardon can relieve him from the judgment of habitual criminality. A man may be adjudged an habitual criminal who has been convicted in this State of two felonies or six misdemeanors. When a person has been sentenced under this law the court sentencing him must notify the Police Department of every city and the District Attorney of every county in the State.

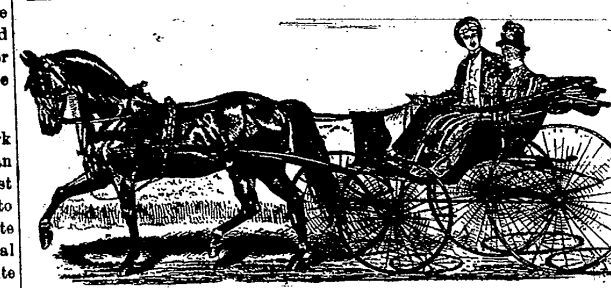
