The Regan-McCarthy Wedding.

From last Wednesday's Wellsville Reporter we copy the following:

The marriage of Mr. D. P. Regan, of Andover, and Miss Mary R. McCarthy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Eugene McCarthy, of this city, took place at the Church of Immaculate Conception at 9 o'clock this morning. It was one of the largest and handsomest weddings ever celebrated in this church, and the friends of the bride and groom crowded the auditorium to overflowing. The altar and church were most beautifully decorated with a wealth of lovely flowers. The handsome bride was attired in a stylish and becoming dress of white silk, with pearl front, and was attended by her sister, Miss Julia R. McCarthy, as bridesmaid. Mr. T. K. Regan was the groomsmen, while the ushers were Messrs. D. J. McCarthy, of Elmira, T. Hyland and T. L. Padden, of Andover, and E. T. McCarthy, of this city.

The Very Rev. Dean Leddy conducted the nuptial high mass in his usual solemn and impressive manner, and afterwards delivered to the worthy young couple an address full of good counsel and advice.

After the ceremony the wedding party and guests repaired to the residence of the bride's parents on Dyke street, where a reception was held and elegant refreshments served.

Mr. and Mrs. Regan left on train 29 for Chautauque, whence they go to Chicago and other points in the West, afterwards returning to make their home in Andover. They have the best wishes of a host of friends for a pleasant journey through life.

Can Anybody Answer?

It is well known that cherry brush, cut and partly dried, when fed to cows, is rank poison. Will you please investigate and if possible ascertain whether this was the cause of their death.

We have not succeeded in obtaining any new light on the question of what caused the death of Mrs. Wilcox's cows, but the following item clipped from an exchange, indicates that the brush has done its work in Cattaraugus county:

"Investigation shows that some hitherto mysterious deaths of cows about Franklinville was caused by feeding them wild cherry twigs and bark. Feed is so scarce that cows are fed on 'bowse.'"

Severe Storm on Cuba.

The electric storm that passed over Cuba and the western part of Allegany county Saturday evening was the severest and most destructive to both life and property that has been known by the oldest inhabitants. At about 6 p. m. the storm broke upon the community of Cuba with terrible fury, and continued for nearly an hour. The heavens were lurid with the electric fluid and rain fell in torrents. Flash after flash of lightning, followed by terrible claps of thunder, made the scene terrific. At North Cuba, Henry Roberts came home from his day's work at about half past 6 o'clock. He went to shut his barn door, and just as he reached the building, a bolt descended and killed him instantly.

The lightning also struck and killed a young man by the name of Clapp, five miles west of Cuba on the Friendship road. Clapp was in the employ of Geo. Clark, a farmer, and was engaged in some work in the barn when he was instantly killed. The barn of John Farwell, on Dutch Hill, several miles northwest of Cuba, was also struck by the lightning, setting it on fire. The barn with its contents and one horse was burned to the ground. The property was insured.

Several trees in Cuba village were also struck, and one bolt passed from a tree into the residence of W. P. Stevens, doing but little damage.

FELL INTO A CULVERT.

Dennis Looney of Hornellville Fatally Injured at Tip Top.

Last Friday evening four young men from Hornellville were put off train 10 at Tip Top. They were riding on a car platform and had no ticket. The conductor slowed the train, intending to stop, but while the cars were still moving the boys jumped to the ground. Three of them alighted safely, but Dennis Looney fell into a culvert and sustained a serious fracture of the skull. He was also otherwise injured. The train backed up to where he was lying and he was taken aboard and carried to Hornellville. He was placed in charge of physicians at the hospital in that place, but his injuries proved so serious that there was no hope of saving his life. He died on Monday.

T. F. Wilcox of Cuba visited his son, H. F. Wilcox of this place, last Thursday.

There were two more fatal cases of diphtheria, half a mile east of Alfred Station, last week. Of the five persons who have thus far died from the disease, two, as we are informed, were children of Daniel Cook, two were children of a Mr. Austin, and one, a young man named Lewis, son of John J. Cook.

Robert Boyd, a farmer of Andover, recently dug two hills of potatoes of the Green Mountain variety, in which there were 34 potatoes, measuring a peck, the largest weighing a pound. This is a specimen. In case potatoes bring 50 cents a bushel, Andover farmers will stand at the front.—Alfred Sun.

This (Wednesday) morning about 4:30 o'clock, Mrs. O. P. Crandall sustained a stroke which resembled paralysis in some respects, and which rendered her unconscious, in which condition she remained a number of hours, a gradual slight improvement being noticed later in the day. At the present writing she has not improved in a marked degree, but it is hoped she may soon show signs of greater improvement.

For about two weeks past up to about three days ago, M. H. Harman has been totally deaf. The first of this week he noticed that his hearing was returning in a very slight degree, and has been gradually improving since. He is unable to hold conversation with people, but if the improvement continues, he will doubtless be able to do so within a short time.
