- RULE 1.—That not less than 5 cents per line be charged for resolutions of respect, and local notices of entertainments from which revenue is to be derived.
- RULE 2.—Cards of thanks to be charged \$1.
- RULE 3.—Obituary notices, except such as are published as a matter of news, and lists of wedding presents to be charged for, not less than 5 cents per line.

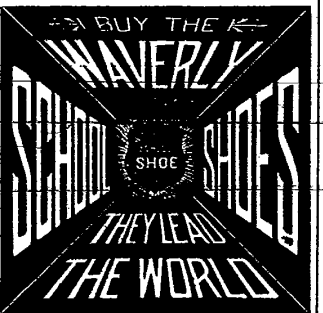
