It has been recently argued that women should not be given the suffrage, as they are inexperienced in political affairs. But if they are inexperienced in political affairs, the suffrage is just what they need in order to give them experience. For the same reason that these objectors urged against woman suffrage the slave should not be given his freedom, because he is inexperienced in liberty, and nobody should be allowed to go near the water unless he can swim.

No reply to Dr. Rainsford's plan of establishing saloons of a moral character by putting them in the hands of good men is more conclusive than these words by Dr. Lyman Abbott, with whom I disagree so often on this question that I am doubly glad to be able to quote him. "We shall not get rid of any proportion of the liquor traffic by establishing reformed saloons. The saloon, a place which encourages men to drink between meals, can be reformed only by being abolished. The object of temperance reformers is not to promote moral reform saloons but to abolish the saloons altogether."

The saloon is the great and unrivalled barrier that impedes the poor man's progress to independence and plenty. Into the coffers of the American saloon the wage earners of the country generously pour a billion of dollars a year. American opportunities are wasted because of the maddening curse of drink. Destitution and want in this country, in the vast majority of instances, are the result of profligate patronage of the saloon keeper's business. If so many toilers of the land simply camp in the wilderness of great tenement structures and drag out their lives in hopeless poverty, the lamentable fact is, to an alarming extent, the result of paying a too generous tribute to the liquor seller's trade.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Salamanca residents have begun a crusade on the valueless dogs of that village.

A pearl button factory will be started by home enterprise in Canisteo. Twenty persons will be employed.

E. A. Childs of Wellsville has been appointed County Court, Stenographer. He began his duties at this week's court.

Editor Stillman, whose eye was recently injured by a ball, will not lose the sight of the organ, as was at first feared. Glad of it.

Swindlers are said to be catching farmers in certain localities by buying cattle, paying one-third cash and the balance in bogus checks.

George Young of Almond has patented a bicycle tire made of braided rope for the exclusive right of use of which he has been offered a goodly sum.

Tons of pears, principally the Bartlett variety, are being shipped from Palmyra and vicinity. The growers are grumbling at the low price, which is only sixty cents a bushel.

It was reported last week that oil had been struck in a test well being drilled near Belfast, and that the well is good for eight or ten barrels a day. If the report is true we will hear more about it.

A. J. White, who has until recently been manager of the new Hotel Sherwood, in Hornelssville, has left that place. It is said he also left many debts unpaid. The hotel is now managed by other parties.

Several lots of good dairy cows have been sold in Chautauqua county during the past few days as low as \$7 per head. Scarcity of feed makes the sales necessary in many cases, hence the low prices.

Charles Leon Pettibone, a lad of 14 years, whose home is in Hornelssville, disappeared a few days ago, and no trace of him can be found. He is a bright boy, and there is no reason known for his leaving home.

Hanford Kendall, son of C. B. Kendall of Kushford, has received a scholarship in the University of Minnesota, at Minneapolis. This appointment comes to him from the merits of his work at Cornell University.

A doctor in Dunkirk has made a careful examination into the cases of a number of cattle that have died in that vicinity from a disease supposed to be anthrax, and gives it as his opinion that it isn't anthrax, but gastritis.

Mt. Morris is suffering from a plague of blackbirds. Their ravages so far are confined to the corn crop. Swarms numbering thousands may be seen daily alighting among the standing corn and wherever a flock feeds scarcely an untouched ear can afterwards be found.

Edward J. Moran of Fredonia is a student of natural phenomena and mathematics. His latest task was to count a million. Working ten hours a day, he found that the task required 47 hours and 35 minutes. He counted one, two, three, etc., up to 100 and then repeated. That is almost as senseless an occupation as riding on a bicycle 1,000 miles in a given time.

A fast stock train was descending the hill from Almond Sunday about 11 a. m., when Engineer Combs who was drawing the train, had his attention attracted by the wild antics of a tramp on top of the second car from the engine. Mr. Combs construed the signs as a signal to stop, which he did. The tramp then showed him a broken wheel on the car on which he had been riding. The train was stopped only just in time to avoid a disastrous wreck. The tramp had been riding on the bumpers, but when the wheel broke he got on top to stop the train.

John Seely, an employee of the United Natural Gas Company, met with a sudden death, yesterday afternoon, on the Sid Coon lease, three miles east of Ceres. His business is to take care of a number of gas wells. The gas is run from the wells into iron tanks twenty feet long and eighteen inches in diameter, called coolers, before it is run into the big mains which carry it to the towns. He went to the Coon lease to turn on a well that had been shut in for two weeks. He turned the valve and stood close by the tank, when it exploded, killing him instantly. His skull was crushed and both legs and one arm broken. The well showed 250 pounds pressure.
