ANDOVER BOARD OF TRADE.

Looney Didn't Die.

Dennis Looney, the young man who fell into a culvert at Tip Top while trying to alight from a moving train, didn't die last week Monday, although the News said he did. His head was cut open, a part of the brain oozed out, and he was in so critical a condition that the doctors who attended him said he couldn't possibly live. The report was circulated among the railroad boys that he was dead, and the news of his death came to us from what we called a reliable source. Nevertheless Looney began to improve on Tuesday, and it is now thought he may recover.

A Boy Shoots His Playmate.

A sad shooting affair took place at Wellsville Sunday, the particulars of which we copy from the Reporter as follows:

"About noon Sunday, Jimmie, the 10 year-old son of Wm. Baldwin, who lives on State street, was shot by a playmate, Eddie Demuth. The victim died at 3:40 p. m.

"Young Demuth, a lad about 11 years old, the dead lad and a younger Baldwin boy called 'Chubby', went to the Baldwin barn and into the hay loft. Here they found an old army musket lying on a beam, where the father, who is in the habit of shooting chickens with it, had carelessly left the gun. Young Demuth and Chubby are unable to tell just how the thing happened, but the shell in the gun exploded as the boy took it down and the charge of shot entered the face and neck of Baldwin. He staggered down stairs and out into the yard, where he fell unconscious and never revived.

"Dr. Koyle was summoned and later Dr. Collier and Dr. Witter, but nothing could be done for the unfortunate lad. "Demuth was badly frightened and realized that a terrible accident had happened. He disappeared and was not found till some hours later by some boys who traced him to Stannards Corners and back to the hill above State street."

Remedy For Potato Blight.

The cause of blight in potatoes is no longer any secret, says the Cattaraugus Republican. It is well known that it is the effect of a fungus that lives and grows in the leaves and that the germs of it may come in the air or may exist in the soil. That potatoes grown on land manured with stable manure, especially when it is fresh and not well decomposed, suffer more from the disease than others grown on unmanured soil or by the aid of mineral fertilizers is well known. It is also well known that with animals; those that are in a weak condition from whatever cause, are most apt to take the infection of contagious diseases of similar origin to that of this potato disease and it might appear very reasonable to judge the same of plants.

Henry Didecock, a successful potato grower of Great Valley, uses the Bordeaux mixture as a remedy for blight, and says he has found it effective. It should be applied early, before the vines get strongly infected with the disease. The mixture is made of four pounds six ounces each of copper sulphate, quicklime and molasses. Dissolve separately in water and then mix with added water to make fifty gallons. Spray the vines on the first appearance of the blight.

NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

The village of Atlanta, Steuben county, had a \$30,000 fire last Thursday.

A Hornellsville firm will construct Canaseraga's system of water works.

Scio is again connected with long distance telephone line and a pay station has been located in the store of J. B. Sherratt.

The N. Y. & Pa. R. R. has been graded to Rexville and the iron will soon be laid. It is not likely that the road will be extended to either Canisteo or Hornellsville, at least for the present.

An eleven-year-old girl of Cameron Mills named Horton pointed a revolver at a younger sister in play yesterday afternoon, and the weapon exploded, injuring the younger child, probably fatally.

The Canisteo Fuel Gas Company is again in operation. Gas was turned on Thursday evening, and the Company is said to have overcome all obstructions in the way of future success. The gas furnished now is said to be superior to that furnished heretofore.

W. J. Hoyt and Chas. F. Vincent have purchased the hardware business in Wellsville lately conducted by Lewis & Wells. Mr. Hoyt was formerly in the dry goods business in Wellsville, having been a member of the firm of J. Hoyt & Co. He is well known throughout this section and the new firm will doubtless do a large business.

Lester Dyke, of the town of Wellsville, was arrested the first of this week, on the charge of poisoning some cows belonging to a neighbor, Wm. Ballamy. When Dyke was found he was in the act of plugging a water pipe which supplies Ballamy's farm house. In the poisoner's pocket was found some apples loaded with paris green and some capsules also containing poison. His examination took place yesterday at Wellsville, and he was held for the grand jury, with bail fixed at \$1,000, in default of which he was taken to jail.

Mr. George Sortore, a farmer living near Belmont, had a singular experience a few days since. He was on a load of grain and the wagon started to upset. He tried to jump from the uphill side of the load and in his course landed on his neck on the hind wheel of the wagon. His head was turned a quarter around and his neck was dislocated. A physician, with the assistance of a neighbor, pulled his head around in place again and the bones came together with a noise that could be heard several rods away. Sortore is able to be up and will soon be as good as new, notwithstanding the close call for his life.

By the will of the late Moses Burr of Angelica, the valuable collection of historical relics of his grandfather, Major Moses VanCampen, the famous scout and border man of the Revolution, and later the esteemed civilian and public official, consisting of the compass, Jacob staff chain, etc., with which he subdivided over 150,000 acres of land in Allegany, his rifle, bullet pouch, bullet moulds, powder horn, etc., are made over to the Wilson academy library as soon as a proper place for them shall be prepared. This valuable collection of historical mementoes will find a permanent abiding place within a stone's throw of the house in which, on November 10, 1807, Moses VanCampen, as judge, organized the first court and charged the first grand jury in Allegany.
