Gigantic Petrified Oysters

A bed of petrified oysters has been found on the top of Big Mountain, just back of Forkston, Wyoming County, Pa. A short time since A Judson Starke and Wm. N. Reynolds. Jr. of Lafayette Collège, amateur geologists of Tunkhannock, spent a day on the mountain and brought back a fine collection of them. Some of the specimens are of mammoth of the specimens are of mammoth size, one measuring twenty-two inches long by nine inches wide, and weighing forty pounds. The specimens range in all sizes, from this down to the ordinary edible oyster of the present time. Some of the specimens show the eye of the oyster perfectly, and in all of them the specimens show the eye of the cyster perfectly, and in all of them the meat is easily removed from the shell. The bed seems to be confined to a small mound resting on a broad lateau, at the externe of the plateau, at the extreme top of the inountain, near the Sullivan County line, and was first unearthed by workmen in grading a railroad from Lopez to the Jennings Brothers' lumber tracts.
