**Another Oil Strike.**

**Fifteen Cents for Potatoes.**  
The Pardon & McGinty Produce Co. began yesterday to ship potatoes. The price paid is fifteen cents a bushel, and farmers do not like to accept the small price offered, which is the same as dealers are paying elsewhere, and is all the market will afford. There seems to be a difference of opinion as to whether they will be worth more in the near future.

The Cuba Patriot says: Surveyors are going over the line of the Erie between Hornellsville and Salamanca laying out the grade for double tracking the western division.

The Hornellsville correspondent to the Elmira Telegram says: A party of Erie surveyors came to this city several weeks ago and quartered at the Osborne house. The object of their presence was not discovered for some time, but within the last two weeks the fact leaked out that they are engaged in making surveys on the Western division between this city and Tip Top for an extra track. Their labors may not cease at the latter place, the belief existing that when the double tracking of the Western is once commenced it will extend the entire length of the division.
