## Seven Years Without a Birthday.

If any of the readers of the NEWS have the distinction of having been born on the 29th day of February, in a leap year, they will doubtless be interested in reading the announcement that should they live until the close of the year 1903, they will pass seven years without having a birthday. This may sound a little like one of Deloss Remington's fishing stories; but as the gentleman referred to is always able to produce proof that his stories are true, even so are we prepared to demonstrate the truth of the assertion above made.

It is commonly supposed that every fourth year is a leap year, and that those persons who were born on February 29 are able to celebrate the anniversary of their birth with clock work regularity every time the quadrennial period is completed. But the maxim, "every rule has an exception," is true in this case. The secret lies in the fact that the year 1900 will not be a leap year. The rule for determining which are leap years is as follows: "Every year whose number is divisible by four without a remainder is a leap year, excepting the full centuries, which, to be leap years, must be divisible by 400 without a remainder. If not so divisible, they are common years."
