#### BALLOT LAW POINTERS.

In voting at the election this fall the elector will use the "bianket ballot," with the names of candidates of all parties on one ticket.

The column on the official ballot headed by the eagle will contain the Republican State and local nominations for all offices to be voted for

The column beaded by the star will contain the Democratic nomina-

The column headed by the ship will contain the Democratic Reform

Organization nominations. The column headed by the fourtain will contain the Prohibition nom

inations. The column headed by the three

leaf clover will contain the People's Party nominations. The column headed by the arm

and hammer will contain the Socialist Labor nominations. The em blems are solely for the guidance of voters who cannot read. The name of the party will be printed at the head of each column.

There will be a column on the right of the ballot in which a voter may write the name of any person for whom he desires to vote who is ot nominated by any party.

Directly beneath the party emblem, in each column, will be a circle. To vote a straight ticket, the voter will simply make a cross (X) mark within the circle in the column containing the names of candidates for whom he wishes to vote.

If a voter wishes to vote a mixed ticket he may do so in either of two

1st. By ignoring the circle under ty emblem and making a cross (X) mark before the name of each candidate for whom he desires to vote in whatever column his name

2d. By making a cross (X) mark in the circle under the emblem in the edium containing the greater num ber of candidates for whom he desires to vote, and then making a cross (X) mark hefore the name of every can didate in the other columns for whom

HE ANDOVER NEWS be wishes to vote. His vote will then counted for all candidates in the column under the circle where he has placed the mark except for the offices for which candidates are marked in the other columns.

Remember this: Do not draw a line through the name of any canprosched the silver question as a didate, nor make any mark whatever, bimetallist. He ought to know, but on the ballot except the cross (X) we had an idea that he approached it mark. If you do the ballot will not as though he thought it was loaded. be counted. The only exception to this is as follows: A voter may, in the extreme right hand column, write the name of any person for whom be wishes to vote, whose name is not printed on the ballot. He must also make a cross (X) mark before each name so written.

In addition to receiving a ballot containing the names of candidates to be voted for, the elector will also receive a ballot to be used in voting for or against the proposition to bond battery, and were released on their the State for \$9,000,000 for canal im provement.
