"In the question of right and wrong it is of little importance that a few fallible men, constituting what is called a majority, are all of one mind. Supple or insane majorities are found in every age to sanction injustice. It was a majority that passed the Stamp Act and Tea Tax, which smiled upon the persecution of Galileo, which stood at the stake of Servetus, which administered the benedict toocrates, which called for the crucifixion of our Lord. These majorities cannot make us hesitate to condemn such acts and their authors. Afloat on the throne of God, and not below in the footprints of a tramping multitude, are the rules of right, which no majorities can displace or overturn.

The admission of women to the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal church seems to be generally regarded as a foregone conclusion, and with good reason. Of the conferences which have held their annual meeting thirty-two have voted—and at least three of the number unanimously—in favor of the Baltimore amendment, which provides that lay delegates "may be men or women." The Ohio Conference not only voted "for," but showed its faith by its work in electing Mrs. Jane Bashford, wife of President Bashford, of Ohio Wesleyan University, as one of its lay delegates to the supreme body of that church. It is a noteworthy fact that with one exception, the only conferences voting in the negative were those made up of foreign nationalities; nationalities whose women in the home land toil in the fields, not infrequently yoked with oxen and with dogs. It is not likely that English speaking Methodist churches in America will be found standing by the continental idea of woman any more than they are found countenancing the encroachments of the "continental Sunday."
