REPUBLICAN VICTORY!

A CLEAN SWEEP IN NEW YORK STATE BY A VERY LARGE MAJORITY.
The Entire Republican County Ticket Elected—Republican Gains Everywhere Except in New York City—The Tammany Ticket Elected.

If Tuesday's weather had not been quite so pleasant it is probable a larger vote would have been polled throughout the State. Some farmers thought there was more money for them by staying at home and rushing the fall work along than in going to town to vote. The result is that a light vote was cast all through the State. But the stay-at-homes did not all belong to one party, and the Republican ticket received, this side of the Harlem river, a larger majority than it did two years ago when the same State officers were elected.

IN THE STATE.
The Republican State ticket is elected by about 67,000 plurality.

The next Senate will stand: 37 Republicans, 50 Democrats.

The Assembly will stand: 100 Republicans, 50 Democrats.

The Tammany ticket is elected in New York city by about 25,000.

OTHER STATES.
Ohio is Republican by 80,000. Massachusetts is Republican by a heavy majority.

Pennsylvania is Republican by 150,000 majority.

New Jersey is Republican by 20,000. Maryland is Republican by about 15,000.

Kentucky is Republican by about 3,000.

Virginia, where only a Legislature was elected, is Democratic by a greatly reduced majority.

TOOK CARBOLIC ACID!

John C. Smith Mistakes a Bottle of Carbolic Acid for Medicine and Dies About an Hour Afterward.

John C. Smith, whose residence was in the town of Alfred, about one-half mile north-east from Tip Top, died today (Wednesday) from the effect of a teaspoonful of carbolic acid which he took by mistake, supposing the bottle to contain medicine which he was in the habit of taking. He took the acid twenty minutes before eleven o'clock, and died one hour and ten minutes later.

Mr. Smith was 73 years of age. He leaves a wife, and also three daughters: Mrs. F. M. Lee of Tip Top, Mrs. James Witter of Alfred and Mrs. C. A. Rogers of Plainfield, N. Y.

The funeral will be held at the house Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock.
