Straws show which way the wind blows. The Retail Liquor Dealers' National Association at Washington last week, in view of the evident concentration of the temperance movement, urge more radical steps for the protection of their interests and more powerful organization at the legislative capital of the nation. They pledged themselves to resist all law-making power against the liquor traffic from which the hurricane of a people's righteous wrath can gather force to sweep the nation clear.

In the West are two States, Kansas and Nebraska, which furnish a field for comparison of the results of prohibition and high license. In Kansas we have prohibition at its worst. In Nebraska we have high license at its best. The prohibitory law of Kansas went into effect on May 1, 1881. The high license law of Nebraska went into effect June 1 the same year. For more than twelve years the law peculiar to each State has been upon its statute books.

There were sold in Nebraska, in 1891, about 96 and two thirds times as much beer per capita as in Kansas during the same year. It may be claimed that while the sales of beer were so much greater in Nebraska, the sales of spirituous liquors were greater in Kansas. The report of the Commissioner of Internal Revenue effectually answers that: "During the eleven years ending April 30, 1890, that officer reports as collected in these states because of the manufacture and sale of spirituous liquors a total amount of \$18,433,098, of which \$675,934 were collected in Kansas, and \$17,757,164 in Nebraska."

NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Fred Rebbon, collector at Geneseo, is short in his accounts \$300 or \$400, and is under arrest.

The new armory at Hornellsville is to be dedicated on December 27, when an armory ball is to be given.

E. C. Olin was arrested for setting fire to a Corning cycle store, the other day. He confessed the crime.

John S. Rockwell of Angelica, has formed a partnership with a Buffalo attorney, and will remove to that city.

Elmira is defending suits that aggregate \$100,000 mostly instituted by people who have been injured by defective sidewalks.

On Thursday the first street car that ever traveled the streets of Corning was run from the power house in the fifth ward to Painted Post over the new electric railway.

A woman who gave her name as Mary Fanning, and her residence as Cuba, N. Y., blew out the gas in her room in a hotel at Richmond, Va., last Friday, and came near dying as the result.

The two large tanneries at Olean have been ordered shut down by the U. S. Leather Trust. It is understood that the two Wellsville tanneries are also to shut down very soon. — Wellsville Reporter.

By order of the Pennsylvania Tanning Company the Root & Keating tannery at Port Allegany was closed at 12 o'clock Wednesday. It will throw about 200 men out of employment. The shut down is for an indefinite time.

A mammoth cheese is to be made at the Vance cheese factory at East Concord. The cheese will be 38 inches in diameter and 30 inches deep and will weigh about 1,200 pounds. The cheese is to be manufactured for a firm at Erie, Pa., and will contain \$100 worth of jewelry. It will be cured in the Collins Station. It will be cut at Christmas time and delivered to the good people of Erie.

Of the three burglars who took \$250 worth of clothing from the store of Morris Unger in Friendship recently, who were captured at Corning, two have been taken to Warsaw to answer to a charge of burglarizing a jewelry store at that place while the third is held in Belmont jail to await the action of the grand jury on a charge of burglary in the second degree.

The Erie is taking out all the "head" switches on their line and are leaving nothing but what is termed "trailers." This is to avoid all possible danger from broken switches or those which might be misplaced, for with the "trailer" the train will always keep the main line. With no open switches to be run into and the entire line equipped with the block system, accidents will be reduced to a minimum.

W. W. Oxx, a well known attorney of Hornellsville, has announced that 40 claims have been filed with him by pensioners against that city and Steuben county, for the recovery of city and county taxes paid by them on property purchased with pension money since the law was passed exempting such property from taxation. The total claims aggregate \$6,000, and range from \$500 down to small sums. Mr. Oxx states that he will present the claims to the Aldermen and Supervisors, and, if proper action is not taken, he will then bring suit for recovery, and is confident he can force the collection of each of the claims. The result of the cases will be watched with interest by attorneys. If Mr. Oxx is successful with his case, hundreds of others will be brought.

Charles Douglass has been arrested at his home in the town of Harmony, Chautauqua county, charged with the murder of Mrs. Winslow Sherman and Mrs. Cynthia Davis, which occurred in the town of Busti, in the same county, last December. The arrest was made on information of a detective, who has spent several months' time on the case, and who asserts that his information is conclusive. The murders were most deliberate and atrocious. Mrs. Sherman was 70 years old, and her daughter, Mrs. Davis, 46. They were in the former's house alone on December 17 last, and when the rest of the family, who were at a funeral, returned they found the women dead with their heads crushed by some blunt instrument. Suspicion pointed to several persons, and two or three arrests were made, but the suspects proved their innocence and were released. Search was last week made of Douglass's home and grounds and under the barn was found a coupling pin, just the kind of an instrument the murders were evidently committed with. Douglass is a farmer.
