The sole question connected with the reorganization of the Erie rests in the willingness of the management to earn money to the credit of the road and on its own merits and not put the earnings into the pockets of speculators. Alas, how many men have made colossal fortunes out of the Erie and how few investors have seen a cent's worth of their money returned!

The proposition to bond the State to an amount not exceeding \$9,000,000 for the improvement of the Erie, Oswego and Champlain canals, has been carried by a majority of about 100,000. Many of the counties in the State not directly interested in the canal voted strongly against the outlay but the counties along the canal together with New York gave such heavy votes for the proposition it was carried.

On the woman suffrage issue in Massachusetts the majority adverse is about 80,000. It is estimated that at least 10,000 were cast by women for the suffrage. This would leave an adverse masculine majority of over 90,000, besides the demonstration that about 90 per cent. of the women, taking the state through, do not care to vote at all. It is believed that this vote will do much to check further agitation. The greatest obstacle which the advocates of equal suffrage have to overcome is the opposition or indifference from their own sex. When a good sized majority of the women in this country, or in any state, shall demonstrate that they want the ballot, they will not be long in getting it. The people of Utah having complied with the prescribed conditions and approved the terms of admission to the Union, the United States now number 45, the next Senate will have 90 members, and the next electoral college will cast 447 votes, making 224 necessary for a choice of President. Among the experiments which Utah, like every new state, is about to try, are full woman suffrage and juries of eight instead of twelve persons.
