## DOUBLE TRACK?

Statement by an Erie Official That Will Interest the People of this Vicinity.

Last week an official of the Erie railroad, who is unquestionably in a position to know the plans and purposes of the Erie Company, made the statement that the road is to be double tracked from Hornellsville to Andover and possibly to Wellsville. He said that the surveyors who had recently been over the road from Hornellsville to Wellsville had made their report to the officers of the company in New York, and that after due consideration of the report and other matters pertaining to the project, the said officers had decided upon the course above outlined.

It would not be proper for the News to give the name of the gentleman who gave this information, but we will state that it came to us, not as a rumor, but as a positive statement by one who knew what he was talking about. We give it to our readers as it was given to us, and it appears to be more definite and authoritative than anything hitherto published concerning this project. ### Mrs. G. M. Janes Receives the Prize.

Last spring W. Atlee Burpee & Co., seedsmen and florists of Philadelphia, offered a long list of prizes for flowers and blossoms raised from their seeds. The awards have just been made, and this morning Mrs. G. M. Janes received a check for \$25 for the second prize in New Mammoth Verbenas of the Fordhook Famous variety. This was the highest prize given in this State for anything, and the second in the United States.

### Enforcement of the Law.

Ex-President Harrison, in his introductory paper of a series of articles on "This Country of Ours" in December Ladies' Home Journal, writes vigorously of the great necessity of the people insisting upon the strict enforcement of the laws. Directly upon this point he says: "We need general assemblies of the people in the smaller civil subdivisions, to be held regularly once or twice a year, town meetings in which two questions only shall be considered: First, are the public officers faithfully and honestly transacting the public business? Second, are the laws—not this law nor that, but all laws—enforced and obeyed? All questions of law reform should be excluded, left to parties or societies organized to promote them. The enforcement of the law, whether we opposed or aided the making of it; the strict accountability of public officers, whether we opposed or aided their election, should be the objects and the limits of these meetings."

## NEAR-BY NEWS.

A Few Outside Happenings in Which Our Readers Will Be Interested.

Judge Hamilton Ward of Belmont, will by reason of the age limit, retire from the bench in 1899.

Mr. Parkhill of Hornellsville has been elected President of the New York State Association of Railway Surgeons.

The work of equipping the Erie canal with the system of towing canal boats by electricity will begin at the Buffalo end at once.

There are at present about 4,000 producing oil wells in the Allegany field. The value of the monthly production is \$90,000 at present prices.

John B. Stanchfield of Chemung, acknowledges the expenditure of \$1,585 as a candidate for the Assembly, which is \$85 more than the salary of the office.

The Board of Supervisors of Steuben county appointed a committee to investigate the matter of improving the roads in that county and report their findings to the Board.

A machine for husking corn has been on exhibition in portions of this county. It not only husks the corn but tears the stalks into fine shreds so that cattle will eat them up, it is said.

Richard Ormsby of Canisteo was killed by the cars at that place last Wednesday. He stepped onto the track near the depot just as a train came along, and did not see his danger in time to escape.

Miss Altie Cole of Wellsville, daughter of the late A. N. Cole, returned home Wednesday from Rochester, where she has been under treatment at the Homeopathic hospital. Miss Cole was obliged to undergo the amputation of one foot.

Two young fellows of Scio were before Justice Willard Thomas one day last week, charged by Stanard, the meat man, with taking some furs from his barn. Charley White and George Allen were the culprits. Both boys were held for court. White got bail but young Allen was taken to jail at Belmont.

The Erie has purchased a rotary snow plow, the latest, and generally conceded to be, the best device for the purpose ever invented. A gang of men is now at work lowering the ribbons on bridges along the Western Division, to allow the plow to be used. Every bridge on the division, and doubtless on the whole road, will have to be thus treated.

R. G. Little, of Cuba, a member of the firm of Sullivan & Little, attempted to commit suicide by hanging, Friday morning. Mr. Little has been in very poor health for the past few years, and evidently sought this means to rid himself of his sufferings. From accounts furnished, the facts are substantially as follows: Mr. Little arose from his bed somewhat earlier than usual on Friday morning, and proceeded to the barn. His rising so early in some way excited the suspicions of his wife, who shortly followed him to the barn where she found him. He had secured a rope and fastened it to one of the beams overhead, and was in the act of putting his head in the noose. His wife succeeded in getting him into the house, whereupon assistance was called and Mrs. Little cared for him. At present he is not known whether it will be necessary to remove him to other quarters.
