It is useless to lay the blame upon the men as long as the women themselves refrain from voting when they have an opportunity, as they did recently in Massachusetts and other places, and also while there is aggressive action by woman against equal suffrage, as there is now in this State and elsewhere. In our opinion the only course to be pursued by the suffragists is to keep "pegging away" in the effort to secure new converts among both men and women. Progress is being made every year in this direction, and the victory may be nearer than it seems. We believe that at the present time the cause of equal suffrage has fully as many advocates among men as it has among women.

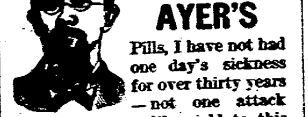
