SUDDEN DEATH OF M. H. HANN. He Expires Monday Night after a Very Brie Illness.

Monday night at about midnight leath removed from earthly scenes one of the older residents of this place, and erhaps, one of the most widely known citizens of this section—Michael H

For some time Mr. Hann had been in poor health, and at times was not able to be about. During the greater part of the time, however, he was able to be upon the streets and attend to his duties about the house. Monday morn ing he arose at about the usual hour but was compelled to take to his bed after staying up but a short time. He grew rapidly worse, and died within less than twenty hours. The direct cause of death was paralysis.

Mr. Hann was born in Otego, Otsego county, N. Y., January 16, 1820. He came to Andover in 1841. He was married April 17, 1814, to Anna Swain, who survives him. The couple were the parents of one son, E. James Swain, who died in 1881.

Mr. Hann's occupation for more than a quarter of a century was that of school teacher. He was an unusually intelligent and well informed man, and was an attentive student of political questions and all other matters that pertained to the general welfare of the people. He also made a close study of the Bible, and was doubtless as well informed concerning the Scriptures as al most any person we could name in local

Mr. Hann was one of the oldest mem bers of the Andover M. C. Church. The date of his first con ection with the church does not appear upon the records, but it is a well atuhenticated fact that for more than fifty years he had been identified with this church and its work. He was a trustee of the church and teacher of the Bible class in the Sunday School when the church edifice was the building afterward owned by Hale Davis, and which now stands upon the corner of Main and Green wood streets in this village. Since that time this church society has erected two houses of worship—the one now owned by the Seventh Day Baptists and the brick sanctuary which the Society now occupies. Notwithstanding his advanced years and feeble health, Mr. Hann continued his activity in church matters, and at the time of his death he was the teacher of the Bible class in the same Sunday School where he labored so many years ago. He attended church and-Sunday School last Sunday, and made the remark to his scholars that he would not be with them much longer.

As a citizen, Mr Hann was most highly respected. He was faithful in all the duties of life, and his family and many friends have the consolation of knowing that his work was well done. The funeral services will be held to morrow (Thursday) at 2 o'clock p. m. at the M. E. Church

After satisfying himself as to the existing conditions, Bishop Ryan executed a discharge of the mortgage and the same was presented to Mr. Donnelly a few days ago, thus not only securing to him the property free of incumbrance, but also stopping the further payment of interest, which amounted to quite a sum

each year.

Mr. Donnelly and his family are nat urally much elated over the good for tune, but their friends, who are as nu merous as their acquaintances, will insist that the parties directly benefitted shall not monopolize all the joy which comes from the good Bishop's kind act, and hearty congratulations to the Donnelly household, as well as praise and thanks for Bishop Ryan, will not be lacking among the people of this vicinity.
