The Belfast canning factory, the first
one to be established in Allegany coun-
ty, packed 659,233 cans of fruit and
vegetables from Oct. 1, 1897, to Nov. 1,
1898. The sum of \$18,850 was paid to
the farmers for raw material and \$15-
504.37 was paid out for labor. The
total amount of business done, includ-
ing the tinware specialties made by the
firm, was \$57,322.37. From Jan. 1st
to Dec. 1st, the company loaded and
unloaded 156 cars on its private switch.

On an average 25 hands are employed
in making tinware specialties. In the
canning season 125 hands are employed.

The capacity of the factory will be con-
siderably increased early in the spring.

This excellent record ought to be an
inducement to other towns in the
county to build canning factories.—Ex-

press.
