School Men of the Hour, WILLIAM H. MAXWELL.

Supt. William H. Maxwell is the FUNERAL DIRECTORS, son of a Presbyterian clergyman, and was born in Swanstown, County Tyrone, Ireland, on March 5, 1852. He was educated in Queen's College, in Galway, and was graduated as a B. A., and took first rank in Latin and logic among all competitors from the three Queen's Colleges-Belfast, Cork and Galway—forming the Queen's University of Ireland.

In 1872 Mr. Maxwell was appointed a sub-master in the Royal Academical LEPARTMENT. Institution, Belfast, and continued in the position for two years, taking at the same time a post-graduate course Having constantly on hand a fine in philosophy and political science at managing editor of the Brooklyn paper work, he again obtained an entrance to the educational field by becoming a teacher and lecturer in the evening high schools of Brooklyn.

In 1882 he was elected associate superintendent of the Brooklyn Board of Education, and five years later was made superintendent. He has been re-elected superintendent four times. Mr. Maxwell introduced, some years


