Homes Wanted for Boys

HOMES WANTED FOR BOYS.
The Children's Aid Society of New York wishes to provide homes in this country for the many homeless boys who come under its care.

The smaller boys come from the best orphanages in and about New York and when received, if they are over five years of age, are sent to the Brace Farm School at Valhalla, N. Y., for further training till good homes can be procured.

The older boys are given some idea of farm life, taught to do chores and simple farm work and can make themselves very useful in country homes. These boys are in their "teens," ranging from fourteen to eighteen years of age and usually receive some wages, depending on the age and experience of the boy.

If you take a small boy he is to enter your home as a member of your family and not as a servant and you are expected to take the place of father and mother to him, so far as possible.

If for any cause the boy sent you is not satisfactory, the Society bears the expense and trouble of his return.

Bad Belmont Blaze

A disastrous fire occurred at Belmont during the night of Dec. 11th, in which the Clark Machine Shops suffered heavy loss. The cause of the fire is unknown.
