## Teachers Training Class

Under Auspices of the Andover High School

MISS SARA L. RILEY, Instructor

Class of 1906-07 Organize September 3, 1906

Tuition Free to Those Taking the Examination

Andover High School is authorized by the department of Education of the State of New York to organize and instruct a Teachers Training Class for the year of 1906-07. With this class the Board of Education has retained the services of Miss S. L. Riley, another year. Her former success in Training Class work is well known by all acquainted with her as to need no further recommendation.

### CONDITIONS OF ADMISSION

I.—Candidates must be at least seventeen years of age at the time of entrance.

II.—They must subscribe, in good faith to the following declaration: "We, the subscribers, hereby declare that our object in asking admission to the training class is to prepare ourselves for teaching; and that it is our purpose to engage in teaching in the public schools of the State of New York, at the completion of such preparation. We pledge ourselves to remain in the class during the year, unless prevented by illness or excused by the Commissioner of Education."

III.—Candidates must hold as a minimum qualification one of the following credentials:

a.—Any teachers' certificate issued in this state.

b.—A standing of at least 75 per cent in the subjects required for an elementary certificate and in addition any twelve academic counts.

c.—A Regents Academic diploma which must include Advanced United States History, English History, Physics, Biology (including Physiology), Advanced Arithmetic and Advanced Drawing.
