1906 IN REVIEW

The year 1907 begins a cycle of new experiences, new hopes, new dreams, and possibly to some of us, a new era. During the passing of the old year have come days of sunshine and clouds to our readers to such an extent that we scan the file of the "News" for 1906, we are almost reminded that life ever moves, and changes of its tents of carrying on its eternal pilgrimage. Under the date of Jan. 5th, 1906 we find recorded the entering into a new life of one of Andover's respected and pioneer women, Mrs. Sally Ann Dyer, who had lived eighty-five years in a town with the life of this community.
