

It is an expedient, a business proposition, and therefore is the purest individual. ism. It is true it is an extension of the powers of government, but not in a socialistic way, and it is to be taken as an example of the HORRI-BLE CONFUSION entering into these discusions of socialism.

I do not believe that socialism is PRACTICAL. Wherever the Socialists have come into power, as in France, when they have taken up the reins of government in any measure they have dropped their doctrinaire theories.
