DIRECT PRIMARY.

the "Indianapolis News," which advocated the direct primary law when it was pending in the Legislature of its State, finds this measure of relief is not what it was claimed to be and frankly abandons direct nominations in this fashion:

"We would by no means give aid and comfort to the enemy, and yet | when we read the pleas for the direct primary system made by our friends in the East who favor it we cannot but think that they need some 'en . lightenment. Perhaps the experience of Indianapolis with the reform is peculiar or it may be that our law is not a good one, but certain it is 1 that those who advocated the direct primary, including the "News," are much disappointed in its operation.

"To-day we have five candidates for Mayor, not one of whom meas-"ures up to the standard which it was supposed we should reach under the direct primary. It is admitted on all hands that if the new machinery is retained we shall have to do something to limit expenditures or Σ throw them on the public, for as things now are we have in effect two elections, two campaigns, and as a consequence two large outpourings of money. This, of course, would be a small price to pay if the results were what it was supposed they would be. But they are not, at least they have not been so far. The good men who, it was predicted, would 'come out' do not do so. The necessity of making two campaign, of contributing to two campaign funds and of twice submitting to the importunities of the 'heelers' undoubtedly increases the reluctance of representative citizens to offer themselves.


