Notwithstanding the repeated statements of Assemblyman J. S. Mr. Phillips believes heartily in primary reform, and always has. He advocated primary before Paul Hanks had been discovered by the Allegany County Political Congregation that today holds this inexperienced youth to the front as a candidate.

Thinking people will care nothing about this noise and bluster kicked up by a faction of the democratic party in Allegany County. We have heard it before and know from whence it came and whither it leads.

What Mr. Phillips has done in the direct primary discussion, he has done because he sincerely believed it was his duty. He has been entirely independent in his action and has allowed his conscience to be his only dictator. 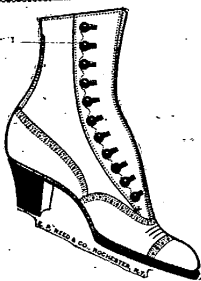

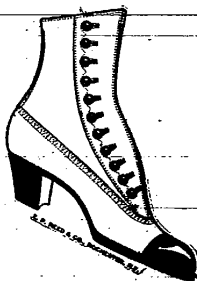
