In another column of this issue of the 'News' will be found Assemblyman Phillips' reply to the untimely challenge of Paul B. Hanks, democratic candidate for member of the Assembly. Mr. Phillips' letter is explanatory in itself and is along the line of the editorial in the 'News' of last week.

Both Republican and Democratic parties have declared in their platform for direct primaries and both candidates for member of Assembly in Allegany County have openly avowed their intention of supporting their respective platforms. Therefore there is no issue between the two great political parties in New York State on this principle. What good could possibly come out of a discussion of this subject. Or possibly Mr. Hanks wishes to oppose direct primaries in the proposed discussion, after his party platform has endorsed it. If that is not the case, he should not ask Mr. Phillips to go back on the Republican platform and oppose measures favored by it. It is hard to get up a scrap between two parties who agree.

This week will see the passing from the gubernatorial mansion at Albany and the Executive chair of the Empire State, one of the greatest men who has ever presided over the destinies of the people of this State.

Almost unknown when he was nominated for the Governorship. He has made a national reputation of the rock-ribbed old fashioned kind, that will be a twentieth century model.

Mr. Hughes was a politician of the new school but there was something better he was and is a Statesman, and he has again demonstrated his ability to control himself.

Never before has there been so clear a demonstration, of the power of the right as exemplified in one man, who won by his dogged persistence. There was no fireworks about Mr. Hughes policies, no play to the galleries. He knew what he wanted and worked until he got it, refusing to enter into any alliances which would compromise him in any way.

The clouds have been heavy and now it will be the spell binders in charge, each trying to tell what the other does not stand for. The voter will make up his mind and mark you this, the whole situation will be decided by the independent voter.

Suppose you and I go through the matter hurriedly, and then you form your conclusion as I have mine. The two conventions each, so the papers say, dominated by one man. Murphy, of TAMMANY HALL, and Roosevelt, of THE PEOPLE. It was amusing to read the head lines in the papers, calling the Saratoga meeting a Roosevelt Convention, Stimson, a Roosevelt candidate, and the platform a Roosevelt platform. What if it is? Now after you have read the above make up your mind which is the better, a convention of the Roosevelt type, which was out in the open which openly and frankly stated the position that it was against dishonest politicians, or the convention which was controlled by TAMMANY methods.

There is something else to think about the local conditions and men who are running for assembly. Mr. Phillips has made his enemies, what man who has been in public life so long as he, has made so FEW? Mr. Phillips return will mean that he is to be guided by men of the Roosevelt stamp, men who will follow his principles.

What if the Democratic ticket is elected, it will mean the Tammany-ism of the State. With Mr. Murphy in control and Mr. Hanks elected, who would control Mr. Hanks? Men of the Roosevelt stamp? Look over the years of history of New York City, read to-morrow the revelations after years of Tammany (mis) rule. And your answer will be—What?

Now take your choice and do not let any dust throwing fog the issue. What the whole question will simmer itself too. Will be TAMMANY or NO.

Which of these two men would you rather have for a leader in the State wide affairs? Murphy of Tammany, or Roosevelt of the People. Your vote and voice is going to decide the matter. THE TAMMANY politicians of New York City have and are losing control through Mr. Gaynor's sturdy mayorality. Now what? Are they seeking to control the whole state?

Republicans may have some black spots on their record. But if you find one on Tammany's liquor, white-slave, hoodie, TWEED, RING, and everything else, record which is WHITE, put it in a curio show, for it indeed will be worth much. It will be needed for campaign purposes.

Sunday morning, September 25, the store of John A. Howlett, on Main Street, in Angelica, was robbed of goods to the amount of \$800. Among which were 40 pairs of men and women's skirts, several bolts of silk, gingham and cloth dress goods, under wear and toilet articles. The theft was not discovered until morning.

Entrance had been gained through a window at the side of the building. It is believed that the plunder was carried away by men and women who came to Angelica in two rigs, thought to have been secured at a Belmont livery. Officers have been following up clues, which it is thought may secure the guilty parties arrest.

Later, Fred Rumpff and wife and Herman Rouse and Miss Lottie Cornish, of Belmont, were arrested on suspicion and eventually confessed the crime. The clue which led to their arrest was furnished by an Angelica lady who saw the rigs driving about town at 1:30 Sunday morning and gave so good a description of them as to place the officers on the right track. The goods were found hidden in the Rouse home.
