

OME people fear to have disease reported because they think it going to put them to great inconvenience and interfere with the life of the whole family. THIS IS NOT THE CASE TODAY. The old idea of controlling disease was QUARANTINE, shutting up a whole household or a whole city or a whole country away from the rest comes from an Italian word that meant "forty days," because when ships in the middle ages came from plague infected ports they were held up for that long period of time to make sure that no one on board would develop plague.
