Twenty-five years ago no one had any very clear idea where the dis-<sup>▲ eage</sup> germs were to be found, and the best thing to do seemed to be to some gas into the air which would find them and kill them wherthey were. So sulphur and formaldehyde disinfection were in-These gases could only be applied to the room, however, at e end of the disease after the patient had been removed.

Now that we know that disease germs almost always leave the body of the sick person in certain definite discharges, in the excreta and in the discharges from the ear, nose and throat, it is much more effective to ANFECT THESE DISCHARGES themselves, and this can be ht along ALL THROUGH THE COURSE OF THE DIS-

If a case of communicable disease occurs in your family the physiis required by law to tell you on his first visit just how the dis-Acharges should be disinfected according to the regulations of the State-A Bepartment of Health. Discharges from the ears, nose and mouth be received on cheap cloths or papers and promptly burned or Addisinfected with a 5 per cent solution of carbolic acid. Discharges from And howels should be disinfected by adding one part of unalaked lime to A eight parts of a watery suspension of the discharges.

Clothing; bed linen, towels, napkins and similar articles used by the Patient should be soaked in a 21/2 per cent carbolic acid solution, then Aboiled for twenty minutes in a strong soapsuds solution (one ounce of Johnson sods to twelve quarts of hot soapsuds). The esting utensils e patient should be kept separate and boiled for ten minutes;
