# The Forum

## THE COMING MAN

Thomas Dixon, in his effective style has told us all about the coming woman, and he is right in saying that she will not come alone. She will come with her man, without whom she would not be perfect, nor he perfect without her. It is of this coming man that I have a little to say now.

The coming man will be a healthy man. The cause of his good health will be two-fold. He will be well born and he will take care of his natural inheritance of physical health and strength.

He will be well born because the science of stirpiculture, that is, race culture, will be so applied as to improve the human breed in a manner different in detail but the same in principle as that now applied to the improvement of the brute creation.

Race culture is capable of effecting as great a change in the natural constitution of man, as has been effected on the stock farm or in the field and garden. Our finest animals are a product of culture that has made greater improvement in these lower forms of life, within a comparatively short time, than has been accomplished in the case of man in thousands of years. Such culture is considered impracticable in the human race, but it is really practicable and that without violating any law human or divine. A new field of culture demands new means and these means exist to the fullest extent within the present social organization. They are indeed applied to a certain extent to every wise and prudent marriage.

Laws already exist bearing upon this subject of race culture and various popular notions have also an influence, thus the science of stirpiculture really exists. It only remains to make it more widely known and to apply it. If half the thought could be given to the improvement of the human race by stirpiculture that is now given to restraining the misbegotten products of ignorance and crime there would be initiated at once a movement that would gradually lift the whole race above its present low level and immensely strengthen the efforts now made to suppress evil tendencies and call men to righteousness. The reformed swine returns to its wallowing and a reformed human beast, even if he does not return to evil ways, will beget such as he was before his reformation. He proves in his offspring that his whole nature was not changed, only his outer life.

The coming man will thus be well born, and what a magnificent product of culture he will be, say about the year 2914. A thousand years of such culture as is entirely possible and practicable would produce a whole race the average man of which would be equal to those now glorified as saints and heroes, while the base rabble that now blocks all high development would disappear and be classed in history with the brutes.

## II.

The coming man will find it easy to conserve all his high powers and to maintain almost perfect health to a ripe old age, perhaps to the average age of a hundred years. He will do this easily because he will be the master of himself. His passions will be strong, but they will be under perfect control. His appetites will be keen, he will be an epicure, but his refined taste will never demand anything that can poison the blood, or rack the nerves, or rob him of sleep.

The coming man will perceive moral truths as clearly as he now perceives physical truths. He will have an appetite for right, and the thought of its opposite will excite the same aversion that disgusting food now excites. He will not steal, for he will not desire what does not belong to him. He will not lie, for he will see no advantage in it. He will not hate his fellowman, for he loves him and he cannot hate and love at the same time. If he is poor he will not envy the rich, and if he is rich he will not despise the poor, for both these emotions are incompatible with high character. The rich and the poor will be scarcely distinguishable by their manners or dress, for culture will be universal and all useful labor will be honorable.

The coming man will be religious. I do not know what church he will belong to, but he will be in spiritual communion with the infinite soul that pervades the universe. He will live and have his being within that soul and will feel himself a part of it. The harmony which a wise manner of life has established between himself and the natural forces to which he is subjected will reconcile him to the universe as it is. He will therefore

be an optimist and will answer the arguments of the pessimist, him who declares that this is a bad world, by showing, in his own life, that this planet is a happy place of abode.

## III.

The coming man will be centered in the home. At that point will be generated and from that point will radiate, as from a central sun, all the agencies that make him what he is, or that enable him to reach out with a helping hand and with a sympathetic heart toward his fellows. He will not be fettered in this home by the resistance of those whom he desires to educate and cultivate. They will be well born, the children of science, and will grow up in physical health and to moral impulses as naturally as a tree grows in good soil.

The coming man will make few laws and scarcely hear of those that exist except such as, in the most general sense, sustain and conserve the outward framework of society. Of laws prohibiting criminal acts and the oppression of the helpless he will know little or nothing, for he will see no use of such laws, since no one would violate them if enacted. He will be a law unto himself and the chief law that will act within him will be the law of love. Whenever his eyes rest upon a living creature his heart will feel an impulse prompting him to do something that shall increase the happiness of that creature, be it human or brute. But such statute laws as are found necessary for the general weal he will observe with the most conscientious care.

The heart of the coming man will go out in warm sympathy to all the nations of the earth, yet it will be centered, (next to home), in native land. He will be a true patriot and if nations less developed than his own attempt to overrun and destroy his home and fatherland he will be found neither too weak nor too tender hearted to resist and to maintain his inheritance and his vantage ground of culture. He will be morally strong and physically strong. He will make mighty conquests by the power of love and will be prepared to guard those conquests with fire and sword if need be.

Is this coming man an impracticable dream? No. Whether he shall ever exist may be a fair question for discussion, but that he is a possibility under existing conditions of earth life is the firm conviction of the writer.
