Alfred Man Had Bad Accident While Working Here Saturday

A. A. Hall, an Alfred Station man, who is employed by the Erie Railroad Company, as a track hand, was seriously injured Saturday while assisting in building a track to the Prangen ice works at the pond.

In some way Mr. Hall slipped and fell in front of a loaded truck. The wheel passed over his right leg and along his right side, crushing his ribs and forcing them into his lung. He also received a serious scalp wound.

Mr. Hall was taken to the office of Dr. C. W. O'Donnell, who dressed the wounds and made him as comfortable as possible, but it was found necessary to take him to St. James Mercy hospital at Hornell because of the seriousness of his condition.

## "THE MOMENT BEFORE," WEDNESDAY EVENING

Pauline Frederick is Well Supported in Strong Role in Famous Playlet

It is the widely contrasting role of a duchess and a gypsy that Pauline Frederick is seen in "The Moment Before."

The picture is an adaptation of Israel Kangwill's drama. The exterior were photographed in Florida, and these are notable in their pictorial effect.

The story is shown in inverted form. The first reel and a half is of the duchess who gives freely of her time and money to charity. As her life draws suddenly to a close following the accidental death of the duke the scene fades into a Gypsy camp, with the gray-haired duchess shown as a black-haired Gypsy looking unconcernedly on a fierce fight of two rivals for her hand. The subject matter contains an abundance of action.

In the role of Madge Miss Frederick makes a striking Gypsy. She becomes the bride of John the Gypsy through force, not through consent. It is primitive loveliness on the part of the man. The real effect of the Gypsy woman comes to the surface when she meets Harold, the younger son of the Duke of Malden.

Thomas Holding is Harold, the dissipated younger son, who following the death of his brother, straightens out in Australia; it is a finished performance. J. W. Johnston is forceful as John the Gypsy, a strong interpretation. Frank Losee makes prominent the part of the elder duke.

The staging of the church scenes gives to them unusual atmosphere. The whole picture, for that matter, is well made. "The Moment Before" will make a good attraction. —Review by Moving Picture World—Advertisement.

## RAILS FOR FRENCH LINES

Said Big Price Paid For Scrapped Wellsville & Buffalo

The scrapping of the Wellsville & Buffalo railway has begun. The rails are being torn up and made ready for shipment. It is said they have been sold to the French Government to be relaid along the fighting line in France. Charles A. Finnegan of the company that took over the road a year ago, says the buyers have not disclosed for what purpose the rails were bought. He thought that the story that they were going to one of the warring nations might have arisen from the reported buying of scrap rails in other parts of the country for war uses.

There are reports that a high price had been paid for the rails and steel girders of the bridges with a bonus for quick delivery.

**SAFETY FIRST BE AUTOMOBILIST**

Secretary of State Working Toward Reduction of Accidents of Automobiles

Albany, Jan. 1919. To bring a decrease in the number of grade crossings, 400,000 folders need of a more "Stop, Look, Listen" type being mailed to the automobile owners.
