SUFFRAGISTS HOPE TO CARRY STATE

Indorsement of Leading Political Parties Looks Like Victory to State Officials. In This State Suffrage Resolution First.

New York, Jan. 29.—Women of New York State will enter the campaign for suffrage this year fully confident that the pledge of the great political parties in behalf of woman suffrage will insure victory for them at the next election. Mrs. Norman De R. Whitehouse, chairman of the New York State Woman Suffrage party, said to-night in an address at the annual convention of New York City suffragists.

"This year we are going into the campaign with what is probably the greatest suffrage triumph of our generation," she said. "I refer to the indorsements given the cause by the Democrat, the Republican, the Prohibition, the Socialist and the Progressive parties. Some times I wonder if we fully realize the great importance of this political support? It means that the political parties of this state and of the country, have given their pledge of honor, thru their respective platforms, to the cause of woman suffrage. It means that in the coming New York State election we shall have the pledged support of all the political workers who follow the leadership of their party platforms."
Mrs. Whitehouse told the suffragists that the woman suffrage resolution is first on the calendar of the state senate of 1917 and that favorable action on it is expected at any time.
"We hope it may be this week or next week," she added, "because we await impatiently the opening of the great campaign to carry New York State for suffrage at the election next November."
