BATH MAN COMMITS SUICIDE BY SLASHING THROAT WITH RAZOR

Bath, Jan. 26.—Irving Stewart, 40 years old, killed himself here this afternoon by cutting his throat with a razor, severing the jugular vein. He went to the barn early in the afternoon, telling his wife he had to do some work.

Several hours elapsed and Mrs. Stewart went in search of her husband. She was horrified to see a pool of blood on the floor, and blood dripping through the ceiling from the upper floor of the barn. She summoned a neighbor who went to the upper story and found Stewart dead, with a razor clamped in his hand.

Coroner Douglas H. Smith was summoned and will issue the certificate of death.

Stewart was employed by the Curtiss Aeroplane Company, of Hammondsport.

His wife and daughter, Mildred, survive.
