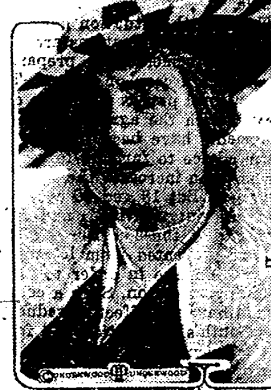
Miss Anne Morgan, Friend of American Working Girls

The altruistic and patriotic work of Miss Anne Morgan, daughter of a great American financier and descendant of an American poet, has come to the public notice many times in the past few years. She appears now as the head of an American circus which the 35,000 young women members of the Vacation Association are giving at Madison Square Garden, New York, for the purpose of raising funds to defray the vacation expenses of working girls during the coming summer.

"Nothing worth while can be accomplished without sacrifice. Every one of the girls in the circus has been rehearsing for weeks, still doing her work every day."

While Miss Morgan is deeply interested in the well-being of her less fortunate sisters, she is also an ardent advocate of patriotism among her sex.

"There is too much talk about patriotism," she avers, "and too lit-

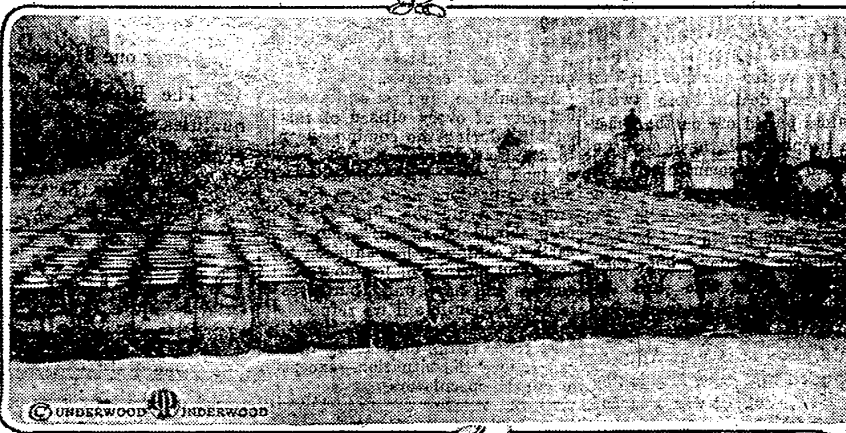


the real patriotism. We have too much respect for words. We think we have accomplished something

when, as a matter of fact, we have only talked about it. We need more unity of vision—more democracy. The women who are patriots are, in my opinion, prepared. They are the groups that have been working quietly.

"But the great difficulty is in holding women. Everyone of them is willing to learn to be a nurse or to run a motor ambulance, or to do other things she may never be required to do. But when it comes to giving so many hours to work that must be done now, many find they have no time. We are trying to teach girls that they can spend their time profitably by devoting themselves to some definite purpose. In our vacation work we have had a fair success. The purpose of our association is not only to encourage girls to save for a vacation, but to prepare them for a vacation—to make them real patriots."

Armed Merchant Ships is Solution of this Shipping Problem



It would be difficult for the lay mind to realize what a tie-up in shipping means to New York. This glimpse of the West Side along the Hudson river, just north of the Cunard piers, gives only an idea of the congestion. There are miles of vistas of this sort, where, figuratively, there are mountains of freight ready for shipment to European countries. These barrels are filled with cottonseed oil. Since the resumption of ruthless submarine warfare trans-Atlantic commerce has been paralyzed. The merchandise waiting transfer overseas represents millions. The congestion is daily becoming more serious in Atlantic seaports as President Wilson urges the passage of the "armed neutrality" measure.

THE POTATO SHOW

Fine Display of Tubers at Alfred, Farm and Home Week.

There were 450 plates of potatoes at Alfred, Farm and Home Week, the Almond Grange leading the exhibit with 116 plates, with 112 varieties.

Alfred Grange had a fine exhibit of about 100 plates. Greenwood Grange had a small exhibit of especially good quality. The silver cup for which Granges compete each year, was for the second time awarded to the Almond Grange. Canisteo High School won the silver cup offered in the high school contest by a close margin over Almond and Alfred High Schools, the Alfred team doing especially good work in the judging contest which was held in conjunction with the competition test.

Suffrage Department

 Update Woman Suffrage Press

Reams of congressional oratory has been hurled forth at the public on the subject: Let the People Rule. But Congressman Jeanette Rankin sounded a new and modern note at Carnegie Hall on February 2, by taking as her subject: Let the People Know.

It is reported that Jeannette Rankin does not want to have the trouble taken to make a name especially for her, which would be the case, if she were to accept Congresswoman Rankin. She has expressed herself as being quite content to be known as a congressman. She aims not to introduce the sex line in politics but to obliterate it.

Joyful shouting was the order of the day in the Ohio Senate when the success of the bill giving presidential suffrage to women was announced. The Lieutenant-Governor in rapping for order found that even his gavel had gone over to the suffragists and broke in his hands rather than stop the rejoicing.

It appears that Ohio women have fallen short of the women of Illinois as far as suffrage is concerned, for the Reynolds' bill which gave presidential suffrage to Ohio women made no mention of municipal suffrage.

Say not that, in a moment of excitement, the Ohio legislature defied the twice repeated edict of the voters and gave suffrage to Ohio women. The press reports that the Assembly long and gravely debated the question and finally decided it 72 to 50.

The arguments advanced by the Judiciary Committee in the House of Representatives in its favorable report on the national prohibition amendment were at once appropriated by the Congressional Union for Woman Suffrage and hurled back at congressmen in the interest of the national woman suffrage amendment.

"Thirteen states can prevent its adoption," said the report. "Thirteen states can also prevent the adoption of the suffrage amendment," retorted The Suffragist.

"If thirty-six states desire the prohibition amendment they should have the right to make it," said the report. "If thirty-six states desire the suffrage amendment they should have the right to make it," again retorted The Suffragist.

It would seem as though the chief object in life of the Congressional Union was to make high officials eat their own words a pursuit in which they appear to be eminently successful.

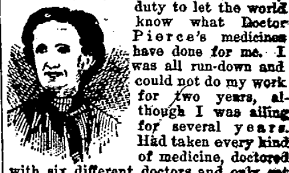
