Deceased formerly lived at Hartsville. He had been to Hornell, and because of his intoxicated condition, had been ejected from a street car and was trying to walk to Canisteo.

Dr. N. P. Brainard is very ill at the family home on Church and Center Street. Last Saturday the doctor went to Wellsville on train 25. He was obliged to hurry in order to make it. He was taken with a severe pain in the region of the heart which became so severe that upon his return at 3 p. m., he went directly to his office on Main Street to procure some medicine to relieve the trouble. He became unconscious soon after reaching the place and was found by his daughter some three hours later in a semi-conscious condition. Early Sunday morning he suffered a second hard attack when Drs. Kysor of Hornell, Comstock of Wellsville, and Probasco of Whitesville, were summoned in consultation.

At this writing the doctor is very ill under the constant care of a trained nurse and his many friends are awaiting anxiously to hear of his improvement.
