**CALLS FOR ARMY OF PRODUCTION**  
**Forces of Destruction Not All Important for Nations at War**  
Ithaca, April 17.—Because farm labor is scarce, and because it believes that agricultural production must be maintained, the faculty of the New York State College of Agriculture has called upon the state and federal governments to take steps to maintain a force of skilled laborers on the farms.  
At a special meeting recently called to consider the food situation, it was pointed out that the United States is confronted with the possibilities of short crops, and therefore must adopt measures to prevent food shortages, so far as possible, both for the benefit of friendly nations in Europe and for America itself. Dispatches from England say that one of its greatest needs is the agricultural leadership of 5,000 trained farmers from the United States; and that after much of England's own farming population had enlisted, many men had to be brought back from the front to help keep up production at home.  
With these facts in mind, the college recently adopted the following resolution:  
Whereas, the United States must contribute largely to the inadequate European food supply; and  
Whereas, labor skilled in farming is scarce; and  
Whereas, several years are required to train unskilled persons for this work, therefore be it

Resolved, That it is the opinion of the faculty of the New York State College of Agriculture that in preparing the nation for the present crisis, due consideration should be given to the necessity of maintaining an adequate supply of skilled labor on the farms.  
Telegraphic copies of the resolution were sent to federal and state officials.
