

INTERESTING NEW YORK STATE PARAGRAPHS

Albion grocers are no longer able to get old potatoes.

Fifty Albion high school boys have enlisted for foreign service.

There has been a branch of the state employment bureau established in Albion.

The senate passed the Wicks bill, establishing a department of foods and markets.

Fifty Caledonia women have organized a branch of the National League for Women's Service.

A preliminary vote in the state senate indicated that the excise tax bill would be passed this week.

At Gardenville the New York Central will erect a 28-stall engine house, a turntable and machine shop.

Permits have been issued in Lockport for the planting of over 100 parcels of land owned by the city.

H. W. Jones of Brooklyn was re-elected grand regent of the New York state council of the Royal Arcanum.

Deen W. H. Horkins, veterinary professor, declared disease, not dogs, to be the bane of the sheep industry of the state.

Senator Brown told the chairman of all committees that they must clear the decks for adjournment on May 4 or 5.

Perry's invitation to the Western New York Publishers' association, to hold its midsummer session in that village, has been accepted.

More than \$2,500 has been raised by popular subscription to purchase a motor truck for the Niagara Falls company in the Third infantry.

Several manufacturing and lumber concerns in the Tonawandas are arranging with their employees to cultivate tracts of land this summer.

Governor Whitman announced that a gantry commission would examine men condemned to death at Sing Sing to prevent further 11th hour reprieves.

Announcement was made of the purchase by the Auburn Sanitary Milk company of the stock and good will of the Cayuga County Dairy company.

Utica newspapers increased their price to two cents beginning May 1. After that date there will be no one-cent papers in Eastern and Central New York.

Many students of the Waterloo high school are enlisting for service on the farms of Seneca county during the remaining two months of the school year.

Miss Iona M. Lewis, aged 19, enlisted in the navy in Rochester, with the rank of yeoman. She has had three years' experience in military clerical work.

The state civil service commission will hold examinations on June 2, for several positions in the state service. Application forms must be filed on or before May 23.

The Slacer bill to prohibit the sale of intoxicants to persons under 21 years of age instead of to those 18, as at present, passed the assembly by a vote of 78 to 52.

Orders have been placed with a Niagara Falls concern for 1,000,000 feet of lumber for the construction of temporary barracks at the civilian training camp at Fort Niagara.

Lockport's chamber of commerce is conducting a questionnaire among the farms in adjoining towns to ascertain their views regarding marketing conditions in Western New York.

The Erie Railroad company is planning to operate a motortruck between Canisteo, Jasper and Woodhull for the purpose of delivering freight, Jasper and Woodhull are off the railroad.

Two cases of infantile paralysis, the first in New York this year, were reported by the department of health. It was said, however, that there was "nothing alarming" in the discovery.

The two-day exhibition of the Eastern Breeders' association at the Broadway Auditorium in Buffalo, resulted in the sale of 101 head of pure bred cattle, bringing a total of \$57,100.

John L. Campbell of Brocton has been selected to supervise the secret service forces of the resource mobilization bureau, connected with the National Guard department in Albany.

After litigation of 7½ years the village of Medina has been awarded \$14,501.20 as its claim against the state of New York for land appropriated for the barge canal by the state.

The senate passed the Graves bill, which prohibits the employment of girls more than 54 hours a week in a restaurant. Hotels are excluded. The bill applies to first and second-class cities.

The Grape Belt Ministerial association, at a meeting in Fredonia, unanimously adopted resolutions urging the administration's plan of selective conscription. It was the sense of the meeting that this country should do its full share in prosecuting the war.

There was a patriotic rally in Peru, when 11 volunteers from that village, who left for Buffalo, were escorted from the village hall to the station by a procession of nearly 2,000 people, headed by a band.

About 700 boxes of cheese were offered at the opening session of the Little Falls cheese board. Of these 408 were large white and the balance twins and all sold at once price, 24½ cents. No skims were offered.

Sun Dance, Wyo., April 29.—The opening of the fishing season brings the story of a man who caught an aquarium with his first cast.
