STEBUEN CENSUS IS COMPLETE

Prof. C. O. DuBois, Having in Charge the Steuben Agricultural Census, Sends News Following Data Therefrom.

The agricultural census for Steuben County which has been taken thru the public schools under the direction of the New York Food Supply Commission is now practically completed. The results show conclusively that the farmers of Steuben County are willing and ready to do their part in increasing the production of food.

Crop Acreage to be Increased

Indications are that the acreage in crops for the county this year will exceed that of last year by more than 10,000 acres or an increase of about eight per cent. In this, however, farmers are handicapped by the lack of help as there is a shortage of more than 1100 farm hands in the county.

Some Seed Shortage

In general the seed situation is not acute though there seems to be some shortage. This does not take into account, however, the seed in the hands of dealers upon whom many farmers normally depend for their supply. The greatest apparent shortage is in potatoes but as the supply for the state is only three per cent short it is quite possible that the demand may be met from outside sources. There is also a considerable shortage of seed beans.

It is a significant fact that many potatoes are being shipped out of the county and into other states which would indicate that the supply is far from exhausted.

Stock Situation Normal

The stock situation is normal except in the case of sheep. There are 564 work horses for sale as against 165 needed. The demand for dairy cows, heifers, brood cows and pigs about equals the supply. There is a demand for about 1,000 more breeding ewes in the county than there are for sale.

Poultry Production Low

A striking feature of the report is the falling off in poultry products and especially in the number of eggs to be incubated, which is a reduction of about 25 per cent, from last year.

In general there seems to be no cause for panic. Every effort will be made to furnish farmers with seeds at reasonable prices. It is understood that there is also a movement on foot in the county to guarantee a minimum price of \$1.00 per bushel to all who wish to contract their next year potato crop at that price.
