### O. BERT TROWBRIDGE TO HAVE CHARGE OF FARM CADET WORK

Pulaski, May 4.—O. Bert Trowbridge, vice-principal and head of the agricultural department of the Pulaski High School, has been appointed as an assistant to Joseph M. Bonner of Richland, superintendent of the Second supervisory district of Oswego County.

He will have entire charge of the farm cadet movement through out the second district; will investigate the records of all cadets at the time of enlistment and also will have supervision of their services on farms during the season. Prof. Trowbridge also will carry on his regular system of junior and senior projects already inaugurated.

The agricultural department of the local high school has been abandoned for a time, resulting from the withdrawal of a large number of students who have been taking that course and are now employed on farms throughout this section.

The attendance of students in the academic department also has been decreased for the same reason.

It was stated here to-day that the agricultural department of the Mexico Academy and High School and of the Hannibal School had practically been abandoned, students having withdrawn for the purpose of engaging in farm work.
