Every Male Citizen Over 21 Program as Outlined by Those is Years and Under 31 years of Age Must Regiser Between Houss of 7a. m. and 9 p. m.

The President has designated Tuesday, June 5, 1917, as regis-tration day, in a formal proclamation, at which time every male citizen between the ages of 21 and 31 must report to the election district in which he lives and register. A failure to do so will an a year's imprisonment.

This registration is not op-tional, but obligatory. The Pres ident has provided for those who from home or too ill to get to the registration place.
There are no exemptoins. Every

Andover man who has passed his 21st birthday and has not passed his 31st must either present him-self for registration between the hours of 7 a. m. and 9 p. m. or suffer the punishment,

For the information of all, the War Department has issued the following in the Official Bulletin, which will guide you safely. Read it carefully and remember that June 5 is the day.
"The War Department is grafi-

tion.

Registration is dis-tinet from selective service. Registration is a necessary prelimin-ary to the later process of selection
