DOLLAR POTATOES

Farmers are Being Offered a Guaranteed Price for Potatoes Next Fall on Three Different Contracts by Food Commission

Deputy Sheriff James M. Pawell of ifornell has been des nated as local representative the Steuben County committee in charge of the work of contracting for potatoes for the New York ood commission.

which potatoes are bought, one proposition being to buy the potoes outright by the bushel in he field and the other to allow for the possible raise in price ith a guarantee of 90c a bushel The following propositions are ubmitted to the farmers:

Proposition 1.-A contract to buy your crop of potatoes at dollar a bushel at harvest time.

Proposition 2.- A contract to uy your crop of potatoes at not less than 90 cents and split the difference between that price and the market price at any time you choose to sell, one-third of the crop to be delivered in December, one-third in January, and one-third in February. To illustrate:

of potatoes are selling for \$1.50 a bushel, the farmer would receive the difference between 90c and \$1.50, or one-half of 60c
plus the 90c, or a \$1.25 a bushel.
Proposition 3.—Seed, furnished
by the food committee to those

who need it and the grower may take all the speculation chanhe sees fif to take. The only condition upon which the seed will be furnished, however, is that the grower shall give the food committee the first option to buy the potatoes at the market price.

Many have already contracted
for their entire crops and as a

result many farmers have increased their acreage. The guarantee enables them to proce a safer basis and the act of the commission in making the guaran fee will increase the potato crop throughout the state.

Professor C. O. DuBois of Alfred University has been instru mental in having a permanent committee appointed for Steuben committee appointed for Steuben County, they being John E. Olm-stead and Jay Gelder and Egbert Dudley of Bath, Professor Du-Bois is also contracting for potatoes in his section.
