

...per farm. With high grain and conditions not good for large yields, with this year, it seems well to keep on hand as much hay as can be well cared for and handled.

The New York State Food Supply Commission, through its local representative in the Farm Bureau Office at Belmont, N. Y., is working hard to meet the need for additional farm labor. Practically all the high school boys in the county, and many of the boys from the grades are now at work on farms, as Farm Cadets. There is still need for much more labor, especially thru the harvest season. There are very few men in the county who can be hired for this work.

The Commission has opened an employment office in New York City, where agents who have had years of experience in picking farm help, are on the lookout for men who have had farm experience and will make good farm hands. The Commission will send these men to farmers who apply for them thru the Farm Bureau Agent, and accompany the order with a check or money order for their transportation from New York, which will range from \$8.00 to \$10.00 in Allegany County. As security for the railroad fare, the man's baggage will be shipped direct to the employer.

It is important that the farmer rate the wages that he is willing to pay, and the accommodations to be given, as this is some measure of the kind of man required. It will be difficult to obtain good men at less than \$35 a month for the summer.

Men can also be obtained on the same basis from Rochester or Buffalo, but the supply is much more uncertain, and there may be considerable delay in filing orders.

It is the object of the New York State Food Supply Commission to secure definite information as to idle and unworked agricultural land in the state thru its county representative.

We wish to ask that anyone who knows of vacant unused farm land, either owned by individual, municipalities, or by the state, will send information as to its location, acreage, character or crop, adaptability, and the names of farmers living near such pieces of land, direct to the representative. This request is made as one of the items of patriotic duty which we believe every citizen should be willing and glad to do.
