**NEWSPAPER BIRD DOGS**  
 Washington, D. C., June 16. —  
 Mr. George Creel, who because of  
 the slip between the Executive  
 and the Congressional dinner  
 missed out on being the only live  
 "saw" in the United States,  
 has expressed the opinion that  
 the day when reporters should be  
 "bird dogs" on the scent for  
 news, should pass, since he be-  
 lieves this to be the day for real  
 live newspaper men, who can  
 write live stuff. Mr. Creel's "Of-  
 ficial Bulletin" appears daily,  
 and it is a newspaper giving au-  
 thentic useful information. It is  
 quite possible that the sugges-  
 tion advocated by William Jen-  
 nings Bryan, may evolve out of  
 the start made by the Creel pub-  
 lication. Mr. Bryan's idea has  
 been that there should be a  
 Government newspaper, and he  
 would have the legislative fea-  
 ture of the publication edited by  
 committees of the political parties  
 represented in Congress. The  
 Creel publication is a sort of pot-  
 pourri of information—covering  
 every phase of Government activ-  
 ity.

**McAdoo, the Salesman**  
 There are none so blind that  
 cannot see "salesmanship" writ-  
 ten all over the course of Sec-  
 retary McAdoo. He found more  
 places where war bonds should go  
 than the weather man locates as  
 spots on which to spill showers of  
 rain. "Liberty bonds" for brides,  
 babes, graduates, lodges, unions,  
 corporations, millionaires, patriots  
 and pirates, were advocated by  
 the McAdoo organization. And to  
 make it sure that there would  
 be no misunderstanding the Sec-  
 retary took "swings around" the  
 circle, and dropped bonds by  
 the thousands, and millions.

Of course everybody helped the  
 Liberty Bond sales, but the tall,  
 lean, lank Secretary of the Treas-  
 ury was the real Willie boy who  
 put the scheme across. "The same  
 methods that he used when he  
 took the dead proposition of tun-  
 neling under the Hudson River,  
 were employed in the interests of  
 the Government during recent  
 weeks.

Mr. McAdoo has demonstrated  
 the fact that he is one of the  
 greatest salesmen in America.  
 And it is a good thing that he  
 deals in fine securities, especial-  
 ly in view of the fact that he is  
 able to sell his goods faster and  
 in bigger quantities than any other  
 living human being.

**No Junkets For Junketers**  
 It is announced that there will  
 be no junkets in behalf of the  
 fixing of tariff schedules, by the  
 agents of the Federal Tariff Com-  
 mission, until after the war. Val-  
 ues in foreign commerce bob up  
 and down with amazing frequency  
 and the fixing of schedules, or  
 the establishing of a basis for  
 traffic, is as uncertain as the  
 movements of Pat's flea — "now  
 you see him, now you don't." The  
 Tariff Commission will not be  
 able to do much in a constructive  
 way until the war is over. And  
 its efforts will likely not be di-  
 rected in the hope that there will  
 be any early results.

**Raiser Dickens With Dick**  
 The A. B. Dick Company has  
 been ordered to cease selling its  
 machines under restrictions, pro-  
 hibiting the use of supplies other  
 than its own manufacture. The  
 Dick Company makes a mimeo-  
 graph, and the stencil paper used  
 on it for duplicating purposes, as  
 well as the ink required for the  
 machines, has been retailed at  
 very high prices. The Dick Com-  
 pany, by reason of its patents,  
 has had a substantial monopoly  
 in the business. Now the Gov-  
 ernment proposes to take a hand,  
 and the Federal Trade Commis-

tion has forbidden the purchase  
 in restraint of trade. The Dick Com-  
 pany has been prohibited by the Dick Com-  
 pany.

**Railroad Investors Become In-  
 quisitive**  
 The Interstate Commerce Com-  
 mission has been listening to the  
 real owners of railroads during  
 the past week. It has been pointed  
 out to the commission that the  
 National Government has availed  
 itself very freely of all the "good  
 offices of the roads, while" con-  
 tinuing the policy of "putting  
 off" relief for the great trans-  
 portation companies. This is why  
 the actual owners of railroad se-  
 curities have been getting to-  
 gether for the purpose of consid-  
 ering what to do with reference  
 to their property interests.

At a meeting of investors the  
 other day, more than \$3,000,000,  
 000 of actual investments, was  
 represented. This made up nearly  
 one-fifth of the actual capital of  
 all the railroads. In the confer-  
 ence there were six hundred rep-  
 resentatives of banks, insurance  
 companies and individual invest-  
 ors. An organization was effect-  
 ed with J. S. Savies Warfield as  
 president.

The situation which faced these  
 people had to do with the actual  
 existence of their properties, in-  
 asmuch as the railroads are re-  
 quired to pay out by reason of  
 increased prices this year over  
 last year for equipment, supplies  
 materials and labor, more than  
 \$500,000,000. It is interesting to  
 know that among the reasons for  
 these enormous increases that the  
 fuel bill will advance \$100,000,000  
 and that locomotives and cars  
 will cost \$195,000,000 additional,  
 materials and supplies \$162,000,  
 000; wages for trainmen \$60,000.

**Endless Investigations**  
 With one fell swoop the fed-  
 eral Government appears to have  
 been able to dispense with most  
 of the burdensome problems which  
 curtails its activity, but in its  
 relations with the railroads there  
 follows investigation after investi-  
 gation, and hearing upon hear-  
 ings. For aware of the fact that  
 there must be an increase of rates  
 and no doubt its members be-  
 lieve the request for the fifteen  
 per cent. raise is perfectly proper.  
 Nevertheless, every fossil of a  
 politician from all parts of  
 the country must first be heard,  
 and air his views as to how the  
 political situation of his bailiwick  
 will be affected, before the great-  
 est of all American enterprises  
 can be permitted to grow, thrive  
 and be useful—in keeping with  
 the other institutions of the coun-  
 try. The railroad investors, in  
 their conference, seriously dis-  
 cussed going before the people of  
 the country with their case; and  
 it was contended that the Amer-  
 ican public always stands for a  
 square deal—and that in view of  
 this fact, that justice to the  
 actual owners of the roads might  
 be more readily obtained from  
 the people themselves than from  
 a dilly-dallying lot of officials.  
 Ex-Governor Stokes says that in-  
 vestors must first mobilize their  
 strength before they can carry  
 weight in political centers like  
 Washington and state capitals.
