—Francis P. Weart died at his home in Friendship, June 27th, aged 70 years.

—Word comes to Andover that Charles Durand, of Moscow, has listed in an auto ambulance and started for service today night.

—The body of W. E. Cass was brought to Friendship for interment from Chicago where he was killed in a street car. Mr. Cass was 73 years of age.

—The first meeting for work of the Andover Branch of the American Red Cross was held, Sunday afternoon, July 11th, at the library, and 25 ladies were present. As soon as supplies at headquarters come the donations will begin work.

—Employees of the Empire Gas Fuel Co. working on the new up station below town got their fingers burned quite unexpectedly when a bolt of lightning struck somewhere on the 8-in. line between Andover and Cornell, following up the line to station, last Friday.

—American dogs are being sent to France and are already working for Red Cross work. According to present plans three hundred dogs will be attached to the Red Cross ambulance unit and will be trained to find American wounded on the field, particularly in wooded territory.

—A terrific storm swept over the county Tuesday afternoon, leaving a trail of heavy loss in many places. The Town of Friendship and vicinity was damaged by wind and rain. The damage to crops and property is lamentable. Four cows and numerous heads of stock were killed. The damage to property is estimated to be more than one thousand dollars. The storm was reported from many parts of the county.

—John Casey is reported seriously ill at his home on South Hill. Mrs. Daniel McGinty is assisting in the care and work of the home.

—Jesse Stevens, aged 28 years, of Cuba, met death in a horrible manner July 5th, by being run over near Hinsdale by a work train. His body was cut in two at the waist.

—The W. C. T. U. will hold their annual picnic Friday afternoon, July 20th, at the home of Mrs. Georgianna Hardy. Committee of arrangements are Miss Engsworth, Mrs. Mourness and Mrs. Livermore.

Mr. Hunt had four trout, the largest being a 3 1/2 lb. native, and the smallest 1 1/2 brown, the four of them weighing just 10 lbs.
