## PAIGN FOR FOOD CONSERVATION

Part of the State Food Conservationists are Training Housewives in the Art of Canning and Preserving.  
Every county of the State has for the enlistment of women in food conservation is being organized under the direction of the State Food Supply Commission. Thirty food conservation extension assistants have been sent to various parts of the State and they are not only addressing housewives, but they are also conducting conservation meetings enrolling women in the movement. The result has been established in the remotest corner of the state is as active as in the larger centers. Demonstrations of canning, salting and methods by which a saving can be effected are held in all parts of the State and reports submitted to the Commission show that the work is being appreciated. The elimination of waste and the conservation of products of the State are features of the work given careful attention in attendance. Demonstrations of soap making are also

conservation workers are women, home economics experts who received their training at the State College of Agriculture at Ithaca. The offices established have become a source of information for all pertaining to food and conservation. In most cases files are located with the Bureau of Extension. In addition to teaching and demonstrating preservation and canning, the young women are making an effort to find a market for surplus products. The conservation representative works with the Home Defense Commissions of Supervisors and boards, but avoids any duplication of effort. The agents reach through the meetings where have come into circulation, tested, recipes have lain in old cook books to generations of housewives long ago.
