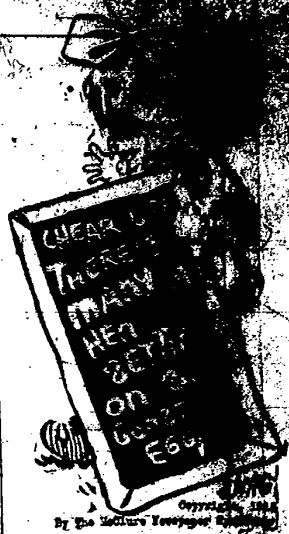

Mrs. Slade received her appointment through the Women's Liberty Loan Committee, which is already making preparations for the second Liberty Loan campaign "to bring home to every woman the financial advantages and patriotic duty of investment in government bonds."

The New York State Woman Suffrage party, through Mrs. Frank A. Vanderbilt, in the course of the floating of the first Liberty loan sold over \$4,000,000 worth of Liberty bonds, more than half of all the Liberty bonds sold by the women of the Second federal reserve district.
