IMPORTANT MEETING TO COME IN AUGUST

Saratoga Will Be Scene of "Last-Lap" Conference.

GOVERNOR TO BE PRESENT

Suffragists Will Gather to Discuss Plans and Receive Inspiration for Last Two Months of Campaign.

The last lap of the suffrage campaign, which, it is confidently expected, will end in the victory of the Woman Suffrage Amendment, will be begun by the holding, on August 29th and 30th, in Saratoga, of a conference of the New York State Woman Suffrage Party. It is predicted by Mrs. Norman deR. Whitehouse, Chairman of the Party, that this conference will be the greatest and most important meeting of its kind ever held by suffragists in the state.

Every elected officer of all divisions of the New York State Woman Suffrage Party will be a voting delegate of the conference. Special arrangements will be made with boat lines, railroads, and hotels. By present indications, it appears that a brilliant and enthusiastic aggregation of New York women from all over the State will assemble in Convention Hall to receive inspiration for their final weeks of grilling work.

Among the important speakers will be: Hon. Charles S. Whitman, Governor of the State of New York; Hon. John Purroy Mitchell, Mayor of the City of New York; Hon. James W. Gerard, former Ambassador to Germany; Mr. Frank A. Vanderlip, President of the National City Bank of New York; Hon. Herbert S. Parsons, New York State member of the Republican National Committee; Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, Chairman of the National Woman Suffrage Association; and Mrs. Norman deR. Whitehouse, Chairman of the New York State Woman Suffrage Party.

Features of the conference will be a mass meeting, reports of officers of all divisions, and discussion and action plans for the final drive for Woman Suffrage.

N.Y. State Suffragists Deplore Militancy

An official protest by the New York State Woman Suffrage Party against the continued picketing of the White House was made on Wednesday afternoon, when Mrs. Frank A. Vanderlip, Chairman of the Ninth Campaign District, and Mrs. James Lee Laidlaw, Congressional Chairman, went to Washington as representatives of that Party.

A message by Mrs. Norman deR. Whitehouse, Chairman of the New York State Woman Suffrage Party, was taken by Mrs. Vanderlip and Mrs. Laidlaw, to Miss Alice Paul, Chairman of the National Women's Party.

In the course of her message, Mrs. Whitehouse said: "We believe that, with victory in sight, our campaign is suffering by reason of the militant methods employed by the Women's Party. The public disapproval and antagonisms aroused by your methods work serious harm to our campaign because a large part of the public does not yet understand that the Women's Party has no connection with our organization. We, therefore, address to you a remonstrance against your policy of picketing, and an urgent appeal to abandon these methods. We believe that this appeal should have weight with you because it represents the practically unanimous feeling of the 500,000 members and 6,000 elected officers of the New York State Woman Suffrage Party."
