The New York Food Supply
 Commission has issued the follow-
 ing call: "Wanted, at once, men
 and boys who have had actual
 farm experience, for work on
 farms. Also women for work in
 farm homes. Show your patriot-
 ism by helping to increase your
 country's food supply." The need
 for the labor called for is great.
 Much of our food supply will go
 back into the ground for lack of
 laborers to secure it. Yet con-
 gress showed its patriotism in
 the matter of passing a bill
 which will shut out all
 laborers unless they can read and
 write. The quickest way to re-
 lieve the labor situation would be
 to repeal all iniquitous immigra-
 tion law. This calling on people
 to dig up and plant their lawns
 while hundreds of farms in this
 locality are abandoned for want
 of farmers, is but "saying out of
 the spigot and wasting at the
 bung." Congress, at the demand
 of labor unions has allowed a
 shortage of labor in order to
 increase the price, and the country
 must suffer in its food supply
 on account thereof, and a front
 yard cabbage patch may help but
 it will not make up the shortage.
 There was no plausible argument
 shown for such a law and a fail-
 ure to qualify under a literary
 test is the misfortune of the immi-
 grant rather than his fault. The
 country today urgently needs com-
 mon laborers in its railroads, on
 its canals, in its munition plants,
 on its farms and in many other
 places and sound patriotism would
 try to remove all obstacles that
 tends to bar its entrance to our
 country.
