AMERICAN SUFFRAGE TO FOLLOW RUSSIAN

In an address to the Russian Commission in New York, the Hon. Herbert Parsons, New York State member of the Republican National Committee, said: "I know of nothing which has appealed to the American idealists as much as has the Russian revolution. It is true, as our prominent suffragists say, that America is backward, in some ways, but never fear, we are going to follow you in Woman Suffrage."
