SWEEPSTAKES

The hundreds of folk who rejoiced at the news that no more whisky can be manufactured in this country also seem to be laboring under the apprehension that it will be very difficult for a man to get a drink of whiskey now.

This contention is hardly borne out by the facts. There is in bond in this country 190,000,000 gallons of whisky, worth \$250,000,000. The normal withdrawal from bond is between 8,000,000 and 9,000,000 gallons per month, although during the past forty days an excess of 2,000,000 gallons has been taken out. So it is apparent when it is taken into consideration that there is also in existence outside of bonded warehouses many millions gallons of unbonded whisky, there is a supply that will last many, many months, probably long after the war is over.

The passage of the war tax bill, however, will stop whisky consumption to a large degree because of the enormous tax which will make a drink of whisky worth at least 25 cents, according to dealers. There is now a tax of \$1.20 on each gallon of whisky and at least \$2 more will be added to a gallon. That will make the tax \$3.20 on every four quarts, to say nothing of what it costs to manufacture and the profits of the various handlers.

"Whisky will be 25 cents a drink before January 1st," said a dealer, "and there are mighty few men who will pay 25 cents for a drink."
